A reading from the Acts of the Apostles (4:32-35)

The community of believers was of one heart and mind, and no one claimed that any of his possessions was his own, but they had everything in common. With great power the apostles bore witness to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great favor was accorded them all. There was no needy person among them, for those who owned property or

houses would sell them, bring the proceeds of the sale, and put them at the feet of the apostles, and they were distributed to each according to need.

Psalm (118) <u>Response</u>: Give thanks to the LORD, for he is good, his love is everlasting.

A reading from the First Letter of St John (5:1-6)

Beloved: Everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ is begotten by God, and everyone who loves the Father loves also the one begotten by him. In this way we know that we love the children of God when we love God and obey his commandments. For the love of God is this, that we keep his commandments. And his commandments are not burdensome, for whoever is begotten by God conquers the world. And the victory that conquers the world is our faith. Who indeed is the victor over the world but the one who believes that Jesus is the Son of God?

This is the one who came through water and blood, Jesus Christ, not by water alone, but by water and blood.

We are Catholic community called to serve God and others through Eucharist, prayer, education, and daily living of the Gospel values.

Everyone is always welcome to worship with us in our beautiful church. It is a house of prayer for all, who with sincere heart desire to praise the only God. The Spirit is the one that testifies, and the Spirit is truth.

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to St John (20:19-31)

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked, where the



disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again,

"Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained."

Thomas, called Didymus, one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples said to him, "We have

seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nailmarks and put my hand into his side. I will not believe."



Now a week later his disciples were again inside and Thomas was with them. Jesus came, although the doors were locked, and stood in their midst and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe." Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." - Now Jesus did many

other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name.

SUNDAY REFLECTION

Most of us, like people of all times, do have a hunger for God. We are in constant search for the meaning of life. But influenced by the scientific mindset, most of us are quick to call for proof for anything out of the ordinary or beyond our experience. Today's gospel gives us an example of a man who felt exactly the same. Thomas wanted a proof of the Resurrection. And when the Lord appeared to him finally, Thomas made the unique profession of faith, "My Lord and my God." This faith proclamation is the foundation of our Christian faith and the strongest

testimony of the resurrection of Jesus. – But Jesus is drawing us to a different point today: What about those who believe without any physical evidence? John, the evangelist, wants his readers to make that act of faith even without proofs. Jesus calls such believers "blessed". Are we blessed Christians in the eyes of God or are we looking for proofs? - **Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe.**
